To all of you who have known me for many years—and others—this is a story a long time coming. March 3, 2005, I completed the training (successfully) for my private license for Hot Air Balloon.

Shortly after returning from New Mexico, we ordered my new balloon. The design was one I have envisioned since my first ride back in the early 80's in Ottumwa. A new idea was

the cat, since I am very much a cat lover. (The pattern with the manufacturer is now "Patti cat") Also, the main color was changed from blue to yellow, as it is a happier, brighter and good to glow color. Now if I could just get dodge to make a yellow van.....I have had a particular name in mind, just in case, but when I saw the first picture of the finished balloon, I said to myself, "My dream has come true", SO, "Patti's Dream", happened.

June 1st, We picked up the balloon from Bill, Louise and Phil, and headed home with a BIG smile on my face. Then, lousy weather and other pre-made plans happened.

June 18th—5:30 a.m.—the crew arrived, pibal goes up—and the time has come for the maiden flight of "Patti's Dream". We go south to find a spot to carry us back to the home place. That spot was the new aquatic park in Nevada. The sky was beautifully clear and winds calm. I had to make a potty break - age or excitement. Good thing McDonalds was just across the way...The balloon was laid out, fans started and my stomach was aflutter with butterflies. This was a day I had waited for, for nearly 25 years..

All went smooth and the balloon set up. MY BALLOON!! With ME under the burner...Everything was ready, I was ready, Richard was ready, I took a drink of water, the tie down was released and UP, UP and away I went. 6:40a.m. I was sure to let anyone within earshot know that this was my first flight in MY new balloon. The feeling had to be close to having a baby; a milestone I never got to know. This was IT!!!!! My baby.....

The chase crew got smaller and Nevada and Story County spread out below. There was a slight NE drift, and then it turned due north. The lower turned west, which was great as I was going over power lines and wanted to come down and skim the fields toward west a bit. The crew was now coming up the gravel road below. I radioed Richard to be sure he was getting pictures. Uh—no camera in the

van..WHHHAT!!!!!!!!! I told him to go on up to the house and get one since I would be there for awhile. About then as I was descending, a horse ran out of a barn ahead and was skittish, so I heated and rose way above, which is where the winds were going east. So much for ground tracking today. The crew was back with me and I asked for another pi-ball so I could check the lower winds as I was starting to think about landing. Guess what..no one could tie the balloon and I was past them by now. No big deal, I needed to get over the next set of power lines before landing anyway. Then the left was gone so on up the road we went. By now a

neighbor farmer had rushed across the miles to watch and join in the fun. He said he passed a county policeman sitting at an intersection; doing close to 100, or so it seemed, but another neighbor that was watching called him and let him know the police car was still sitting and not following. Bill was as excited as anyone when he was there as I landed, 8:10 a. m. and they all came out to help



Trans-Nebraska Revisited

Other than the title of this story, this really has nothing to do with the week-long Nebraska rally of years past. I'd been watching the forecasts all winter for a distance flight opportunity during a weekend and it finally materialized on March 5th, just a day or two after the last newsletter went out. Went to my usual launch site in Norfolk with 5.5 crew in attendance. Forecast was accurate at the surface, winds 340 degrees @ 6 knots made for an easy and beautiful inflation. Two of the crew took off after inflation, they had other obligations but wanted to be there for the launch. The other 3.5 (11 year old son Mark being the $\frac{1}{2}$) packed the fan and settle in for the chase.

And chase it was! Saturday dawned completely clear. I ascended 500 - 800 fpm and leveled off at FL090 (9000 feet above sea level). Normally I set the altimeter to 1000 feet at launch site, no matter the actual elevation. Since we rarely fly far or high, it's easier to remember that actual ground level is roughly 1000 feet below what the altimeter is recording. This flight is different, with communication between me and people other than my crew likely so I figured I ought to fly more according to standard procedure. The winds at 9000 msl were forecast the morning of launch to be 330 @ 31 kts. According to my GPS, they were just a tad stronger at 38 mph but in the right direction. Beautiful, my flight planning was working out. With me in the basket solo and even at these warmer temperatures I could easily do 2.5 hours. Ambient temp at FL090 was already 35 degrees and forecast to warm as the morning progressed.

Forecast called for 12,000 foot winds to be 35 kts so I began another climb. About this time the GPS Janet gave me for Christmas died. Mental note - GPS uses 2 AA batteries about every 6 hours. Forgot to pack a couple in my pocket. I continue past FL120 and level off at 13,100 feet msl - approximately 11,600 above the surface. Try turning on the GPS again and it works long enough for me to see I'm going 45 mph, or 39 kts. The higher I go, the stronger the forecasted wind. I did not apply for the BFA long jump, this was only intended as practice and for personal goal setting, and therefore did not bother to bring oxygen, which limited me to half an hour above FL125 and never above FL150. I decided FL131 was going to be my maximum altitude for the next 20 minutes or so.

No apparent affects of hypoxia setting in, but I descend to FL120 and then float between there and FL110 as I do some in-flight planning. I'm heading for the eastern edge of Lincoln airspace. Flight Service forecasted winds aloft was off about 10 degrees. My bearing is 150 degrees and I was expecting 140, which would have put me about midway between Lincoln and Omaha.

As I cross the Platte River about 4 miles west of Schuyler, roughly half way into my flight, I look back and see Norfolk is finally disappearing into the haze. I can still see it, but not clearly. Also can't see Lincoln yet, it's a little hazier to the south and east. But I can pick out Wahoo, which I should pass a few miles to the west. Columbus is also clearly visible 20 miles due west, which is 45 miles by nearly straight road south of Norfolk.

In-flight planning makes it clear that I will enter Lincoln airspace on the eastern side. I have no aircraft radio, but I do have their phone number. Crew is still able to keep up with me, but barely. I find out later they spent most of their time going 70 mph, I radio down to them to call the tower and let them know I am requesting to descend through Lincoln airspace and land near Davey, a small village about 9 miles northeast of the tower. Crew radios back, "'Air traffic control says no problem, they'll keep an eye out, but does the balloon have a transponder?'" Uh, no.

Since crew has been able to keep up, I decide to land before I get to Lincoln even though fuel consumption says I should be able to travel beyond the city limits and land southeast of town. I do this only for easy crew retrieval as I would probably lose them passing over Lincoln.

I begin my terminal descent 2 miles due west of Ceresco. I can hit 1000 feet per minute in terminal with just me in the basket, but with so little heat to begin with (Max temperature in my 90k cu.ft. envelope was 112F in a high altitude 500 fpm climb), the wind rushing up caves in the sides of the envelope a bit so I add enough heat to puff it back out and slow the descent to 800 fpm. 10 minutes later I'm still in terminal descent but close enough now to the ground where I can level out and get a good idea of surface winds. I'm also now flying under Lincoln airspace, having flown vertically through it on the very edge of the circle that designates the edge of the controlled air zone. Might not have been in it at

all, but since I was in proximity I decided to give the controllers a heads-up and something to watch, there was no activity at the airport.

As I descended, the wind slowed and crew was finally able to get ahead of me for the first time in the chase. Ahead of me are harvested corn fields as far as I can see, with cattle grazing in about half of them. Beyond that is I-80 with few bridges over, and then the out-skirts of Lincoln. Since crew is here, I select a cow-less corn field with a 40 foot wide grass strip along the ditch. This will be a challenge since there are power lines before I cross the road. But it's the best I have so I go for it.

Darn, missed the grass, but at least the corn stalks are cut off short. At about 9 mph, the wind is too strong for a stand-up landing, but the envelope lays out easily across the short stalks. An uneventful but ginger pack-up and visit with the landowner is our only tasks between landing and breakfast. Flight was 2.5 hours, distance covered 85 miles. Propane tanks were still 20% percent full. This was a great practice flight, maybe next year I'll try the BFA long jump and log a flight with 3 digits in the distance column. And unless I start the flight in Chadron and fly towards Falls City, it should be something other than another trip across Nebraska.

Galena

June 17-19, 2005 by Herb Heriford

Just in case you hadn't noticed, it is balloon event season again. The first race for yours truly this year was in Galena, Illinois.

Somehow I had gotten the idea that it was going to require 12 hours to get there from here so I arranged to pick up Ellis at 5:30 am in Columbia and then drive up to Keokuk, Iowa

to pick up his father, Eldon. 8 hours after picking up Ellis we were in Galena, so 12 hours may not have been very accurate. It worked out well since that gave us time to get checked in and explore a bit.

None of us had ever been there so we were kinda surprised to see that this part of the very northwest of Illinois has been severely blessed with hills! Francine, the retired geography teacher who along with her husband Eric had invited us up to this event informed us that all of the glaciers through 4 or 5 ice ages have managed to wander past this section of the planet without ever crossing the area. Thus, the hills remain in such a way that you are almost reminded of the Ozarks around Branson.

The town is really neat. It is still very old looking and has some historical significance. Many of the streets are very narrow. Narrow enough that you must frequently stop for oncoming traffic. Some of the old stone buildings, which are quite well preserved or restored, stand 3 stories tall, 4 feet from the road separated only by a sidewalk. Many have impressive rock walls holding back the cliffs in their back yards. Ellis has decided to build a rock mansion after being there. Neat, small river with an antique-looking bridge flows through the middle of town as you travel down Hwy 20.

We got there early enough that we had time to get settled into our house before the crowds started arriving. We were floored! This house was beautiful! High open arched ceiling with skylights, a master bedroom with a king-size bed and a deck, a bathroom that you could live in including a Jacuzzi tub...great house! The three of us picked out our rooms and stashed everything in the drawers and closets and were checking out the maps when a couple started walking up to the house with their luggage and walked right in like they owned the place! Eldon was going to put them in their place. We had already staked our claim and they obviously had made a big mistake! Turns out, 3 pilots and their crews were staying in the same house that weekend. The 5:00 am alarm got us up and down to the field for the 6 am launch, where we took up a sponsor named Grace for a beautiful ride over the lake to the target - we ended up scoring 53 ft. from center before heading up a thousand feet or so to see the sights. We landed in a perfectly mowed yard on a blacktop driveway, packed up and headed back to the ranch.

Had a nice breakfast and restful day and headed out to the field for an evening flight but since the pibals would go nowhere but straight up we tried a couple of tasks that would keep us around the field. Sure enough, as soon as we launched the light wind took us all away from the field. It was a perfect night for some practice landings so Eric took over the operation of our balloon and had his second training flight. He did 4 landings...2 of them on purpose and the others not bad anyway. Flew about 800 yards in 45 minutes! Went back and glowed by ourselves.

Another beautiful morning on Sunday. There was no Sunday Morning Syndrome at this event. Way too beautiful. Took another sponsor named Sarah and Francine rode along till we flew past the target, then did a swap so that Ellis could see the place. Went up a couple of thousand feet and headed for serious farmland to the northeast. Landed in a field, walked it up to a yard and packed up in preparation for the toast/ceremony. Little did I know that Sarah would be quite that disturbed about getting the fruit of the earth sprinkled on her hair. She immediately jumped up off the ground and proceeded to chase me down with her glass! There may be pix of this if I ever get them developed.

After the brunch we headed for home down the Illinois side of the river. That was a pretty neat drive too. Lots of cute little river bottom towns right on the Mississippi. We drove down below the lock and dam at Keokuk and they gave me a tour of the river front. Man, that's a big river!

Thanks Eldon and Ellis for taking your Father's Day weekend to help me have a wonderful time! I owe you one.

Now, just a short word about a couple of my other flights.

Thursday before we headed north, I was going to fly one of Gary's balloons and take up someone that had earned a ride in the bank balloon. We launched from the airport and headed right over town and soon were floating over Oak Hills golf course. Not having ever met this young couple, curiosity made me ask, "So, are you two boyfriend/girlfriend husband/wife?" She says, "We're just or boyfriend/girlfriend" and he says, "But I'd like to change that right now," and pulls out a ring that would probably trade even up for my house! He said he was going to kneel down but was afraid to move that much in the gondola. She said yes! 28th Ottumwa Pro Balloon Race

We convened at the AmericInn downtown at 2nd street just off Highway 63 at the river. A nice hotel with all the amenities a balloonist needs - shower, bed and a 4:30 AM wake up call. The carnival at the park was also fun and I heard tacos were to die for, but you have to ask the ones that ate them. The parties lasted late into the morning. Others decided to tour the countryside searching for corn, beans, deer and a drink of water from lakes and rivers in the area. After the flight and some propane, it was time for one pilot to repay his decorated crew of nine for retrieving him from a poor landing area to breakfast, however it was almost lunch time so both were satisfied...

Saturday afternoon was enjoyed after a shower and some food. Many chose the pool or water park. Other rooms

echoed the sounds of loud snoring in stereo from one unmanned. Some just relaxed around town but all were taking a break from the heat of 95 degrees and humidity of the same...uugh Iowa summers. You would think the corn would soak up all that humidity but it wasn't happening.

If you were on the ground you got a view of most all of the field and got to witness some impressive maneuvering by some very skilled pilots. After the flight it was time for some more fun at the carnival or visiting some local establishments. Our new local crew told of a Mexican restaurant to die for under the bridge downtown. Were not let down for the quality or quantity only to find out that there was not much left since some other pilots and crews had also discovered this place. MMMM...MMMM...good.
