


My Maiden Voyage by Bob Pieper

The balloon madness all started on August 26<sup>th</sup>, 2002, when my wife Penny thought she would surprise me with a

balloon ride near Stillwater, Minnesota. It was an early anniversary gift. When I realized exactly what she was up to, I had some very mixed emotions. I wasn't sure a balloon ride sounded like my idea of fun, but after some coaxing from her, I decided to give it a whirl. Once off the ground, I not only decided it was okay, but started fantasizing about becoming a pilot myself. This was only a dream for several years that I only occasionally talked about.



Then it came time for the National Balloon Classic of 2004. Penny and I went to Indianola for a long weekend and the balloon bug bit again. I really wanted to do this. Penny started searching the internet and stumbled across the BOI website. She emailed and Jenn invited us to a BOI meeting. We became regular fixtures at the monthly meetings, often quizzing everyone on how to get into ballooning. We made the leap in February 2005 by attending ground school. We had decided that if we could get through ground school and pass the test, we would get our own balloon.. Well, we passed, so we conferred with Rob many times and finally ordered the balloon. She's a beautiful multicolored Firefly 7. (We are thankful for all of Rob & Linda's advice and patience during that process!)

It seemed like forever waiting for her to arrive in Iowa. We finally got the call...she was ready to fly. Now I needed to find an instructor that was brave enough to fly with me. Remember, I had NO experience. We had this beautiful new balloon and no clue what to do with it. Luckily, Joel is a very patient man. He even volunteered his crew to help teach us how to set it up. We are very grateful to Rick, Mary and Dave for all their help that night!

That first night finally came. It was July 14<sup>th</sup>, the Indianola Balloons and Tunes. Talk about nerve wracking! My first flight and all those other balloons! What a learning

experience! Now I had the responsibility of piloting instead of being a passenger. Thankfully, Joel was very patient and helpful. The flight, although a short twenty minutes, went off without a hitch. I soared like an eagle and landed like a butterfly. That flight was a dream come true!

At the May BOI meeting a motion was made & passed to initiate a "Maiden Voyage Column" - to memorialize maiden voyage flights. Everyone who has a Maiden voyage - new balloon, new used balloon, new pilot, new rider, new crew, etc is welcome to write an article for the newsletter. An amendment to the motion was added that a penalty of 1 keg to be provided to the club if no article is provided within 2 editions. So keep sending those tales of your maiden flights.

The 6th Annual Jill Rubin Memorial Flight will be held on Saturday, October 15, 2005. This year the flight will be hosted by Brian & Marcy Bennett along with Dale & Holly Dommer.

#### National Balloon Classic Indianola, Iowa

July 29- August 6, 2005

When the Classic comes around, it's a sign that summer is winding down. After the Classic comes the State Fair, then kids are back to school. The weather had been exceptionally hot and humid, but luckily it cooled off a little right before the Classic. We were hopeful that this would mean a week with lots of flying, but it didn't work out that way.

Friday evening was a beautiful evening. Half the pilots flew off the field, half flew in. Several returned to the field for a night glow. Saturday seemed like a nice morning, but the weather report was that there were 41 knot winds at 625 feet, so we were obviously grounded. The rest of the week continued about the same, bad weather or winds in the morning, windy at night, but it amazingly would settle down about an hour before sunset, allowing a short flight. We flew every evening, but only flew Monday morning, Friday morning and the second Saturday morning. Balloonmeister Jason Jones and his assistants John Jensen and Todd Isley did their best, but the weather just didn't cooperate. John and Todd were stand-ins for Matt Fenster who was home on baby wait. Matt and Emily's baby girl finally arrived Thursday.

Sunday afternoon was a ceremony at the National Balloon Museum to induct Sid Cutter and the late Don Kersten into the Ballooning Hall of Fame. Don was a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa. He was a founding father and Past president of the Balloon Federation of America. In July of 1965 Don Piccard trained Mr. Kersten - in 3 flights! In 1966 he accidentally knocked over an outhouse with his balloon in Indianapolis, Indiana. The event earned him wide notoriety and started a special "Don's Outhouse" event at the Nationals which has been continued in the National Balloon Classic as the "Don Kersten Memorial Outhouse Race". Mr. Kersten's family was there to accept his award. Mr. Cutter was unable to attend.

Monday morning was a very moving Memorial Service for Connie Austin, who died shortly after the 2004 Classic. Friends and family shared memories of Connie.

Saturday afternoon the awards for the week were announced. Crew of the Year was the Pfeifer crew - they crew for 3 balloons during the week. Landowner of the year was Mr & Mrs Art Linsley. Volunteer of the year was Kerry Kasson. Newcomer of the Year was Carlos Zuniga. John Jensen was given the prestigious "John Russell" award. He was also named as the Winner of the National Balloon Classic. Second place was Dick Drake, third was Rob Bartholomew. 29 pilots were flying for BFA Sanction points, 19 of those for the North Central Regional Championship and 14 competing for the BFA Iowa Championship. Top three for NC Regionals were John Jensen, Dick Drake & Rob Bartholomew. John Jensen was named the BFA Iowa Champion.

Next year's National Balloon Classic is July 28 - August 5, 2006.

# Benefit for my brother Bill "Cutty" Mingles

Over the past 16 months my brother has become very ill. Cutty is a member of the Martensdale Fire Department and they are hosting a benefit to help him cover the additional expenses he is now occurring due to numerous hospitalizations this summer and lost time for work, etc.

A brief bit of history: Cutty was born with Juene Syndrome. He has had many health problems, including his 1st kidney transplant when he was seven years old, followed by a second transplant at the age of nineteen. Then his kidney failed again last year at the age of 35 and is in need of a third transplant at this time. He has experienced complications this summer resulting in several hospital stays. This summer he has undergone surgery to remove fluid from his heart, surgery for the removal of the diseased kidney, and most currently has had a chest tube inserted to remove the fluid from his lungs.

Cutty as I stated is a member of the Martensdale Fire Department and is employed by West-Com as an emergency 911 Dispatcher for the cities of West Des Moines, Urbandale, and Clive.

# A Tribute to Benji

This is a story that others may not tell, but I want everyone to know what kind of pilots we fly with in this area. It is a story of honesty and true sportsmanship that we should all follow in the sport of ballooning and in life. It is also an example of how we will be appropriately rewarded depending on the way we act.

Benji Clemons is an excellent competitive pilot and has been flying well all summer. He flew well enough in the Balloon Federation of America's National Hot Air Balloon Championship to finish in the top ten, however a mental mistake on one task cost him points and he finished in 16th place. Another mental mistake cost him at the National Balloon Classic in Indianola.

On the second flight at the Great Pershing Balloon Derby in Brookfield, Missouri over the Labor Day weekend, I had a really good run at the four targets assigned to us that morning and landed just after the final target in a field with a number of other balloons. Benji had taken off in the same area just before I launched and I knew that he also had good scores on all four tasks as I followed him to each of the targets. He was there to help me on my landing and the first thing he mentioned was that a mental mistake had killed him again. He told me that he had forgot to put his competition number on one of his baggies.

The event officials were at the target when he dropped his unnumbered baggie and measured the result because they knew it was his baggie. They were prepared to give him his result and assign a penalty under Rule 12.4.6 of the BFA Competition Rules which states that "Pilots who release unauthorized or modified markers will be penalized up to 250 points". When he found out that this was a possibility, he quickly pointed out to the Event Director that Rule 12.4.7 stated, "The pilot is responsible to insure that his competition number is on the tail of each marker. Failure to do so will result in the pilot not achieving a result". He received 114 points with a "no result" for Task 4 rather than approximately 900 points for his actual baggie drop.

Even with this mistake, Benji was in fourth place and within striking distance of the leaders going into the last task on Monday morning. The flight on Monday was a CRAT into the field and the winds were quick above the surface. Benji again scored well and each of the pilots ahead of him in the standings failed to obtain a result. At the Awards Brunch, Benji was announced as the event winner and was told that his point total was only one point ahead of the second place finisher, Dan Corbin. Benji was appropriately rewarded for his honesty.

Another point that must be mentioned is the fact that even though Dan Corbin also flew very well and was disappointed in not winning the event, he was also proud of Benji and was pleased that if someone was going to beat him, that it turned out the way it did. We all knew that Benji flew all the tasks better than anyone else at the event. I consider it a privilege and a pleasure to fly with pilots like Benji and Dan.



# National Balloon Museum News

The museum will be celebrating Christmas in the Air on Dec.4th. We will be having crafts and Santa for the kids. We would like several pilots to be on hand to answer or explain any balloon questions. Please join us for the festivities. It will be from 1:00-4:00 on Sunday afternoon. There will be 10% off on all gift shop items and if you're a member there is another 10% discount. There will be free gift wrapping also.

We also are in need of help with our Preservation Framing Fund. All our pictures are presently in need of new acid -free matting and UV glass and new frames to extend their life. We have received our first donation to the fund, but are in need of many more. The pictures are costing between \$125-\$200 to reframe, depending on size. We also have several original Watercolors donated to help fund our Preservation Framing Fund. These watercolors are on sale at the Museum.

The National Balloon Museum has joined the IOWA SPORTS MUSEUM ALLIANCE. The Iowa Sport Museum Alliance is comprised of six museums across Iowa which represent the state's diverse sports heritage industry. The PASSPORT program is designed to encourage and reward further study of Iowa's rich sports history. Participants can pick up a PASSPORT at any of the six member museums. When you travel around the state and visit each site you will receive a stamp inside of the PASSPORT to verify your visit. Once the PASSPORT is completed, it can be left at the last site visited or mailed to any of the participating museums and your name will be entered in a quarterly drawing for some exciting prizes. Prizes include everything from a skybox for 20 at a race at Knoxville, tickets to the Bob Feller Night at Principal Field and getting to meet Bob Feller, Balloon Ride, Tickets for two to a University of Iowa basketball game, etc.

These six museums are open year around, are accessible to persons with disabilities and all have Gift Shops on the premises. Admission fees and hours of operation vary so it is best to contact them in advance of your visit. Museum visits can be completed separately over the course of time or perhaps you can make a full weekend of travel around Iowa and see all of the museums in a single outing. There is no deadline by which the visits need to be completed. It is recommended that groups of 10 or more people traveling together should phone ahead to the museums for reservations.

Our son Jon called early in July and said he was going to be flying in an event in Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin late in August and wanted to know if we could join him there. Jon flies the Children's Miracle Network Balloon and that was the sponsor of the Wisconsin event. Jon contacted the organizer and they were looking for additional balloons. There went our second weekend off.

Jon was going to arrive in Wisconsin Rapids on Thursday evening so we decided to arrive early and spend an additional day with him. We were staying in the Mead Hotel in downtown Wisconsin Rapids and the accommodations were great. The hotel was a large convention center hotel and was busy with meetings and weddings in addition to the balloonist. We were scheduled to fly on Friday evening and the first pilot meeting was at the hotel at 5:30 that night. It was evident from the pilot meeting that the event was laid back as John Symonds, the balloonmeister indicated there would be no competition and if you didn't want to tether or nightglow that was OK. He further told the pilots if they were uncomfortable with the weather or flying conditions, they didn't want to fly that was OK also. We could fly from the field or fly into the field during any of the scheduled launches. There were about 31 balloons registered for the event and he requested the pilots to consider flying sponsor rides and that he had about 15 sponsors lined up for rides. It was up to the pilots to volunteer to fly sponsors if they wanted to.

The event was held at the Wisconsin Rapids airport and there were large crowds for each of the scheduled launches. Blair Brody served as the announcer for the event. The best flying area was to the east and fortunately the winds were from the west all weekend. For the first 5 or 6 miles there were limited landing sites but after that there were large open areas with many tracts of prairie chicken preserve areas that were open for landing. To the south and to the southwest there was a lot of timber and a large lake. Further to the southwest was a large military facility, a bombing range that was totally off limits. To the west there were potato farms and cranberry bogs and large areas of timber and wildlife preserves. Ocean Spray had a large processing plant in a small town just west of Wisconsin Rapids.

On Friday evening the rain let up for about an hour and approximately 7 balloons tethered for the crowd. Jon put up

the Children's Miracle Network balloon and was able to pack it away before the rain began again.

On Saturday morning, there was a low ceiling at about 300 feet. We went out to the field with the expectation that the clouds would lift and we could get a flight off. At about 6:30 the skies cleared, a real sucker hole, and we all started to inflate. Several balloons took off and I had my passenger on board ready for flight. Suddenly the overcast reappeared and the wind picked up. When I looked to the sky to the east, I could barely see a balloon in the clouds at about 400 feet. Jon and I both decided to abort our flight at the same time.

On Saturday evening, there was an extremely large crowd on hand to see the balloon flight, a scheduled glow and fireworks. The winds did not cooperate for a flight although one pilot flew into the field from the west and was able to land on the airport. At sundown, the winds let up and we were able to have a nightglow.

On Sunday morning we were treated to a beautiful flight. The winds were light on the surface with the speed picking up to 20mph at about 300 feet with a huge right turn at 400 feet. I took a first time flier and was able to treat her to a spectacular balloon flight. We flew to the east and watched balloons do touch and goes on a lake. I landed in the backyard of a residential property and Jon landed at the next house.

The event was well organized and very relaxed. Each morning at the pilots' meeting there was coffee, fruit and donuts or sweet rolls. On Friday evening the pilots and crew were treated to a Subway and pizza meal. On Saturday at 4:30 before the schedule flight, there was a sit-down dinner served by the hotel. After the glow that evening, there was additional food at the hotel consisting of pizza and Kentucky Fried Chicken.

It was about a 6 hour trip from Des Moines to Wisconsin Rapids and we decided it was worth it. The scenery in Wisconsin is beautiful and the crossing of the Mississippi River at LaCrosse is spectacular. We were able to meet some new balloonists that we had not met before and also saw some friends that we had not seen for some time. We are seriously considering returning again next year. They are looking for additional balloons for the event to make it even more successful. They have raised over \$40,000 for the Children's Miracle Network and that money stays in the local area to help children in need.



# **The Field** by Herb Heriford

★ Discussion on Crew / Pilot party at the Classic

able to tell the pilots where to go!

★ Halloween party discussed. The theme will be "Red, White & Blue - Support our Troops". Discussion on entertainment. Jenn moved that the club purchase a Karaoke machine for less than \$100. Patti 2<sup>nd</sup>. Jenn amended the motion to \$300, so she can purchase some Karaoke CD's. Patti seconded the amendment. Discussion. Someone (who shall remain nameless) suggested we also buy a Gong! Motion carried. The Field...You remember it. You drove past it on the way to Indianola...or Tulsa...or Brookfield. It reminds you of another field. 100 acres of CRP land, perfectly flat, or maybe slightly rolling contours. Surrounded by trees with a tractor path down the north edge. A small bluff peeking out from behind the oaks and cedars lining the east. Easy access from the highway since there is no fence to negotiate.

As a crew member you mentally calculate the best place to walk the balloon to most easily deflate and load it into the trailer without leaving a trace of your presence and without disturbing the two does standing on the far end. As a pilot you check your map to be certain it is not a PZ for any reason and that it has no obvious stubble or thorn bushes that would damage the fabric. Is it a safe place to land? Will your passengers be able to comfortably get to the chase vehicle? Can you tell where the landowner may live so the crew can get permission?

Then you remember drifting gracefully over the last line of trees and making a final check for power lines as you let the balloon cool and descend down over the tops of the weeds, slowly drifting towards the crew. Or maybe zipping over those trees at 20 MPH and preparing to rip out the top as you brace yourself for the inevitable knock down drag out landing you must complete before the envelope gets to the trees on the other side.

You know the field I'm talking about. It stretches the entire 5 hour drive from Jefferson City to Indianola. As you drive past fields or yards on the way to or from a race you can't help but recall past trips, previous landings, your favorite events. They are all stuck back there in the recesses of your

memory just waiting for that field to pop up and remind you. Isn't memory swell! Well, most of them anyway.

Indianola 2005 will remain in my memory but something tells me it won't surface too often. Through no fault of anyone available to blame, the forecasts that the computer gave us all the week before the event proved to be...inaccurate? Of course, we should know better than to put too much faith in a 10 day forecast. The perfect weather that was supposed to happen turned into the extremes of higher winds than some of us were comfortable with, rain, and winds so slow that calling a task would be iffy.

Due to family obligations I was required to leave after the Wednesday morning lack of flight. Leading up to that point didn't actually involve much flying but what flying I did get to do was ... mediocre at best. Oh No! not that the flights weren't fun and valuable, they just didn't involve a great deal of the main ingredient of balloon races...Baggie Tossing! The first flight, Friday night, Brian and I managed to fly over the field just to the east of the hare. We did find a nice pasture to land in and a pleasant farmer. We returned to the field as quickly as we could to set up for a short glow. Two of my crew are aspiring student pilots so they got to get a practice inflate and some stationary burner time. Saturday morning and evening got no line in the logbook unfortunately. A few more than half of the balloons did manage to get off in the evening for the mass ascension. The crowd was huge and really appreciated it but some of us were happy to watch and cheer instead of risking burning a hole in our envelope the night before the competition was to start.

Sunday morning was not flyable for some good reason that escapes me right now, but Sunday evening I was able to take up a sponsor ride. Brian...a different one... was the representative of an insurance company that offered its sponsorship to put on the race. We flew into the field from the front yard of "the Castle" and spent the last half mile of the approach to the field rubbing gently against Rob Bartholomew's balloon as we flew straight over the X about 50 feet in the air. Our toss looked closer than the 16 feet that they recorded but we were going past pretty fast so it must have bounced after it hit!

Monday morning Francine and I lifted off from the back yard of a new-to-the-area family down by Milo. It was wonderful to see their faces as we floated over their house but that was the only wonderful thing about that ride. Just remember, if there is no one else launching there it probably is for a good reason! We floated past the first target one field to the east, The second target one field to the east and the third target...yes, one field to the east. There was just no left turn to be found. Francine did get to see what a knock down drag out landing was like, however! Yee Haa! Monday evening we launched from the field and Mike and I managed to find that surface left we needed. Sailed right over the target! Unfortunately, the baggie we should have been tossing onto the X was comfortably riding along in the chase vehicle. Bummer. Since we had plenty of time before sunset Mike got some burner time but the space between corn fields was a little tight so he let me land it.

Tuesday morning proved to be unflyable so they called the dorm to call it off so we could sleep in. Tuesday evening was supposed to be a fly-in, fly-off night but the winds were brisk so we went on hold for a bit until they slowed a bit. Once again, the more daring pilots flew to the north as some of the rest of us set up to glow as sunset approached. It was still a little breezy but several of us got a chance to entertain the crowd.

Wed. morning was once again threatening rain, wind, lightning, tornadoes or some other nasty weather phenomenon, so after telling everyone good by and promising to meet at the same place and time next year, if not sooner, I loaded up and headed home.

Yes, I did take a different route home. But I passed that field again...No, not the same one but ...the same one just the same. It reminded me of events, the year of which I could never recall, and it reminded me that there are more events to come.

I just can't hardly wait!!!

#### 2005 Riverton Rendezvous by Jim Thompson

Connie and I have been attending the Riverton Rendezvous for the past three years. Riverton is a western community in an irrigated mountain valley in the central part of Wyoming. This was the 25th anniversary for the event and was attended by 32 balloonists. Each year they invite a celebrity balloonist to be their guest and to speak to the balloonists and public at the Friday evening reception. Past celebrities have included Malcolm Forbes, Dewey Reinhart, Ruth Lind, Maxie Anderson and many other notable balloonists as mentioned below. This year's celebrity was BFA Editor Glen Moyer. BFA Director Nancy Griffin and her husband Dan also attend the event. Although the weather was hot, 104 degrees, when we arrived on Wednesday and 102 degrees on Saturday, we were able to get in two beautiful morning flights.

On the Sunday morning flight, I became becalmed and was unable to get to several landing sites where my crew was waiting. Suddenly the winds reversed and I found myself heading to an open green pasture that I had previously passed over at an altitude of about 250 feet. I had noticed and mentioned to my passenger, George Peck, that the horses (about 15 in number) in the pasture were extremely calm. As I approached and prepared for a landing, I told George that if the horses spooked or ran we would abort the landing and fly on. They stood in my path and did not part to clear space for my landing until my last burn when I was only about 5 feet above their heads. Connie had talked with the landowner, Wayne Majors, Jr., prior to my landing. He was pleased to have us land on his property and led Connie into the field with his four-wheeler. I had to try to move the horses from the vehicle path as we exited the field. They were more interested in me than the chase vehicle and Connie finally had to divert around them to drive out. Another example where animals take on the personality of their owner, in this case very calm and friendly.

We have been surprised at the number of former Iowans that we have met at the event. Many of the spectators, crew and even pilots have ties to Des Moines or Iowa and are proud to let us know of their connections. Pilot Alan Jenkins, from Brighton, Colorado is originally from Des Moines and his parents live on SW 17th Street near the Des Moines International Airport. Another pilot, Larry Kline, and his wife from Vernal, Utah were raised in the Algona area and are graduates of Iowa State Teachers College, now the University of Northern Iowa. The FAA observer, James Smith, served in Des Moines and I worked with him at the Classic when I was Event Director. The weather officer and pilot, Joe Sullivan, was stationed at the Des Moines Weather Station in the early 1990's and tried to recruit Brad Temeyer for the Riverton Office earlier this year.

Each of the three years that we have attended, our sponsor has been the local newspaper, the Riverton Ranger. Bob Peck, the Publisher of the Ranger, is a long time resident of Riverton, was the founder of the event, and represents the area as State Senator. Bob, his friend Joanne Knobel, his family, and members of the newspaper staff serve as our crew. Their knowledge of the area and of the landowners is especially helpful. His son Steve is Co-publisher and Editor of the Ranger and following is a July 15, 2005 editorial that appeared in the newspaper. The editorial gives the local perspective of a hot air balloon rally and gives some insight on why this event is special for Connie and me. The editorial is reprinted with the consent of Steve and the Ranger.

#### **Our Skyscrapers**

They say the first time two brothers named Montgolfier flew their hot-air balloon – made of paper, with an open fire burning in the basket – over the French farmland near their home, the local farmers were so frightened that those who didn't flee charged the balloon with pitchforks, thinking the thing was a monster.

The next time the Montgolfiers went aloft, they carried a bottle of champagne with them and toasted the locals when their fire-breathing flyer set down in the countryside. That was more than 220 years ago, but today it's still customary for balloonist to carry champagne.

If you're lucky, you'll get to take a ride in a hot-air balloon at least once in your life. If you live in Riverton, or visit the third weekend in July, then your chances are better than most. We host an annual mid-summer festival here called the Riverton Rendezvous, and its signature event is a hot-air balloon rally.

The rally is far from the only thing happening during Rendezvous. The demolition derby and Day in the Park last week both drew more on-site spectators, as did the rodeo. Many times more people will be at Friday night's street cruise downtown and/or wander through the car and bike show Saturday than will see the balloons up close. All of them are fine, fun events.

But the balloon rally retains its magic – partly because the balloons don't need to be seen up close to be enjoyed. Quite the opposite, in fact. The sight of two dozen balloons, all similar but each different, floating above a field of baled hay, or a plain dotted with sagebrush, or a downtown cityscape, or, yes, an industrial parking lot or even a junkyard, isn't to be forgotten.

That's not to say a close-up look at the balloons as they stand up on the Central Wyoming College launch field for those wonderful few minutes before they lift off and scatter with the breezes isn't one of the best parts of Riverton's year. Even the most-jaded person's heart swells when the balloons tower over the field.

In the early morning July sun, the balloons are our small town's skyscrapers. And then, they fly.

Over the past 25 years, Riverton's balloon rally has brought some marvelous sights. One pilot landed his basket in the Wind River, floated downstream 50 yards or so, then took off again. Once a golf foursome stopped play on the 11th hole at the Riverton Country Club and let a balloonist "play through" as he landed just in front of the green. Once a balloonist landed his basket directly in the back of a pickup truck that was following him.

Once a magazine zillionaire saw his flight rained out, and he sat on a bench and ate pancakes with the common folk who had come to see him. The next morning, with the storm cleared, he flew a balloon shaped like a castle – and almost as big.

Touch & Go

We've hosted the first men to fly a balloon across the Atlantic, the first across the Pacific, the first around the world. We've had the guy who flew his balloon to the North Pole, and the one who made a balloon out of raincoats and used it to escape from behind the Iron Curtain.

We've had the man who invented the portable gas burner every balloon now uses, the man who photographed the milestone balloon flights for National Geographic, and the old Riverton uranium prospector who set ballooning's first great record.

And we also have all the skilled, adventuresome, fun-loving "ordinary" pilots who travel to balloon rallies around the nation each year purely for love. Some have been here many times. Others will fly our friendly skies for the first time this weekend.

It doesn't cost any money to see the balloons, either at the launch field or in the sky. There won't be any car crashes (at least there'd better not be), no bucking bulls, no skyrockets and no cold beer at that hour of the morning.

So we gather again this summer to watch and smile and sigh, all with the full realization that a balloon isn't the fastest way to fly, nor the most powerful, nor the most accurate, efficient of convenient. It is simply, the most beautiful.

#### Great Pershing Balloon Derby Brookfield, Missouri September 2-5, 2005

Forty-four pilots registered at the Elks club for the 2005 Pershing Derby. Competition started bright and early Saturday morning. Balloonmeister Karin Riepe called a MJDG southwest of town, a minimum distance double drop and a fly in task at the field. Early morning shoppers at Wal-Mart got an extra treat - several balloonists launched from the area around the store. Soon the skies were filled with balloons, headed towards the targets. At the MJDG - 17 pilots scored within 10 feet - 9 of those within 5 feet. At the MDDD - only 9 scored and only 19 scored on the FIT. #1, #2, and #3 on the three targets were Jon Thompson, John Jensen & Brad Craig, respectively. After Saturday morning's flight the standings were: 1. Benji Clemons, 2. John Jensen, 3. Dan Corbin.

Saturday morning was the parade, and a unique parade it is. The parade route goes up Main Street, turns around & goes back down. # NABA Nationals

Baton Rouge, LA by Mark Harris

Even though Nationals didn't start until Wednesday morning, Dan and I arrived in town Sunday morning after a 17 hour drive. We figured the extra time would be nice to scout out the area to establish main driving routes to chasing would be less easier, and to have an idea of the launch and landing sites available. The main field was at the Pennington Research Center in the middle of town, so all of our flying would be over the city of Baton Rouge. One of the many lessons I learned was that one day would have been early enough.

Wednesday morning Jim Birk and his staff called a MJDG, FIT, MJDG. There were a few showers within 50 miles but they were light and moving away, so the task was on. I left the pilot meeting and began focusing on the tasks at hand, only to be forced to turn around 3 minutes later because I realized I had forgotten to pick up my GPS on the way out the door, even though I had flown with one several times before. I gave a couple scoring officials a good chuckle; I had forgotten my baggies, too. I couldn't believe how stupid of a mistake that could have been. I tried to stay calm as we went searching for a launch site, trying not to let one mistake carry over into several more. I drove past a couple vans and a truck parked on the side of the road when Johnny Petrehn looked up from a cell phone conversation and gave me the throat-slash sign. Is he trying to intimidate me? Is he gonna kill me, I wondered, or is the flight canceled? Indeed, storms

had popped up near the airport, so the flight was canceled. Thank you, Johnny.

Wednesday afternoon a caravan of chase vehicles drove to nearby Spanish Lake to go on an official swamp tour. There were enough of us to fill their tour boat, and they treated us to some up close views of some giant reptiles and we even got to hold some baby alligators. Check out alligatorbayou.com

Thursday morning brought perfect weather, and holy crap what a task. FIT, GBM, Gate, Elbow. The Gordon Bennet was a cross surrounding the X about 25" in diameter. For the gate task, 6 coordinate we listed, 2 for the border of the south gate, 2 for the border of the north gate, and a middle point for each. The best result would be flying over the center point, but the south gate had a 450-650 AGL limit and the north gate was 1900-2200 AGL. The angle task was the greatest degree of change from a 50-230 degree line, with the final point being were you crossed a defined border made up of streets and grid lines. After the first flight the top 3 were Johnny Petrehn, Maury Petrehn, and Paul Petrehn; all separated by a total of 22 points. The next 3 were Richard Sabin, Mark Sullivan, and Susan Stamats of Cedar Rapids.

Friday morning the Louisiana State Championship pilot reported for a pilot meeting shortly after ours, they would have a launch window 15 minutes after the Nationals pilots. A thin layer of clouds at about 300 feet put us on hold until 8am, but it never went away so the flight was canceled. The weather looked good for the rest of the weekend, so Dan and I figured it would be our only chance to visit New Orleans that afternoon, so that's what we did. New Orleans and Lake Pontchartrain were both beautiful places. I feel fortunate to have seen it all before this summer's devastation. Hopefully they can

rebuild.

Friday night John Nimoya took off in his Cluster Balloon system, the state pilots flew, and the Nationals pilots glowed for exhibition points. Being the rookie, they stuck us up near the crowd, and there were thousands of them! Strangers kept sitting on the platform. The mob kept inching forward, and I kept having to herd them back like cattle. I had to ask people to move so I could get to my basket. They sure were excited, and I got a giant round of applause once I stood the balloon up. People swarmed the basket, so much so that Dan couldn't get with five feet of me

with the crown line. But once I hit the burner again everyone took 2 big steps backwards, and Dan calmly walked up to the basket. They had given us 9 packs of trading cards to hand out with my balloon on them, and originally we thought that would be a bit much, but we handed out a third of those just for that one nightglow.

Saturday morning brought light NE winds and a FIT, MNDD, and a MJDG. Most pilots got to the field before the winds shifted, and nobody got to the JDG. Saturday night the Nationals pilots, and the cluster balloon, flew from the field and the state pilots stayed to glow.

Sunday morning a task was called but the winds were so light and variable that only a couple pilots got anywhere close to the field, and the standings wouldn't change from Saturday. Maury Petrehn was crowded Nation Champion, and after he recognized Johnny and Paul for there achievements in winning past Nationals he thanked everyone for their hard work, and then proposed to his girlfriend Jen, who accepted, of course. Dan and I caravanned back to the Midwest with Jen and Maury, and we finally got back to Urbandale around 5am. I don't know if we'll go back next year, but I was grateful for the experience because I learned a lot, and everyone in Louisiana and Baton Rouge was exceptionally nice.
