NTSB Identification: LAX07CA028.

Sunday, November 05, 2006 in Page, AZ Aircraft: Strategie Balloon Co. Amazon, registration: PPXKY Injuries: 2 Minor, 3 Uninjured.

The balloon's envelope caught fire during the takeoff initial climb and the pilot made a hard landing during efforts to get it on the ground as quickly as possible. During a pre-departure inflation, dry grass cuttings were accidentally blown into the balloon's envelope by a fan used to blow air into the balloon during the cold inflation phase. When departing, the pilot turned on the burners until the balloon started to ascend from the launch field. As the balloon continued through 300 feet above ground level (agl), he noticed that grass cuttings were inside the balloon envelope, and had become engulfed in flames. Shortly thereafter, the fabric on the envelope's throat started to burn, and the pilot pulled the vent line in an effort to descend. The suspension cables began to disconnect from the throat of the balloon as a result of the fire. The basket contacted the ground and two passengers were ejected. The absence of the passengers' weight resulted in the balloon starting an ascent. The fire continued to burn the fabric comprising the balloon's throat and seven additional suspension cables disconnected. The pilot manipulated the balloon back to the surface and the ground crew secured the basket. The National Transportation Safety Board determines the probable cause(s) of this accident as follows: The pilot's failure to identify grass clippings in the balloon envelope during preflight inspection, which resulted in the balloon catching fire in flight.

NTSB Identification: LAX07CA071.

Wednesday, January 17, 2007 in Peoria, AZ Aircraft: Balloon Works Firefly 9B-15, registration: N9087Z Injuries: 1 Serious, 4 Uninjured.

A passenger was injured during a hard landing. The balloon pilot stated that he had selected a landing area on the west side of a highway, notified his ground crew of the location, and briefed the four passengers for landing. He was at an altitude of 200 feet agl with a descent rate of 200 fpm when the balloon encountered a downdraft. The pilot stated that he lit both burners in an attempt to arrest the rate of descent, notified the passengers to be prepared for a rough landing, and began to vent hot air from the balloon envelope to prevent a bounced landing. Upon contact with the ground, the basket tipped over and one of the passengers was tossed out. The balloon was now lighter without the passenger, rose back into the air, and drifted beyond intended landing zone. The pilot continued to the next closest suitable landing area and successfully landed the balloon. The ground crew located the passenger that had been tossed out of the basket. The passenger, who had sustained serious injuries, received medical attention and was transported to the hospital. The pilot reported that the local winds in the landing area were 180 degrees at 18 knots, and that there had been no mechanical failures or malfunctions during the flight. The METAR at the closest airport, approximately 20 miles southeast of the accident location, recorded the wind as calm for the local time of 0853. The National Transportation Safety Board determines the probable cause(s) of this accident as follows: The balloon's inadvertent encounter with a downdraft, which resulted in a hard landing.

NTSB Identification: LAX07CA094.

Sunday, January 21, 2007 in San Martin, CA Aircraft: General Balloon Corp. AX-6, registration: N2447Z Injuries: 2 Uninjured.

The hot air balloon collided with power lines during cruise flight. The pilot stated while en route to his destination he was unable to arrest a descent and the wind blew the balloon into the power lines. The skirts and suspension cables were scorched as a result of the contact. He applied sufficient heat in the balloon's envelope and the balloon ascended to about 300 feet above ground level (agl). Shortly thereafter, he performed a landing in an open field without mishap. The pilot reported no mechanical malfunctions or failures with the balloon prior to impact. The National Transportation Safety Board determines the probable cause(s) of this accident as follows: The pilot's failure to maintain adequate altitude/clearance from power lines.

NTSB Identification: LAX07LA126.

Friday, April 13, 2007 in Mecca, CA Aircraft: ARBC Inc 150A, registration: N156LB Injuries: 1 Fatal, 1 Serious, 4 Uninjured.

The balloon pilot was conducting a for-hire sightseeing balloon ride to five tourists. The pilot had received a weather briefing that stated winds at the closest airport, 7 miles away, were 310 degrees at 11 knots. The next closest airport, about 20 miles away was reporting winds 310 degrees at 12 knots gusting to 18 knots. The forecast for the area had occasional gusty surface winds up to 25 knots. Winds aloft, up to 9,000 feet, were from the north between 15 and 29 knots. The balloon flight manual states that the maximum surface wind speed for takeoff and landing is 15 knots. The pilot determined that the winds at the first takeoff location were not favorable, and took the balloon party to a second location. At the second takeoff location the pilot noted the winds by looking at treetop and had the balloon inflated. He had the passengers load into the basket. Once airborne he

stated that the flight will be shorter than usual because of the winds. In fact the balloon had covered the distance that usually takes 1 hour in about 20 minutes. The pilot gave a prelanding briefing to the passengers, and prepared them for a faster than normal landing. The winds in the landing area were 10 knots with gusts between 15 and 20 knots, which were above the balloon's recommended landing wind limit. As the pilot directed the balloon into the selected landing zone, the balloon began to descend more rapidly than the pilot could compensate for and headed directly for a row of electrical power lines. During the landing approach the basket overhead structure struck and broke through a section of electrical power lines. The balloon basket continued its descent, impacted the ground hard, bounced up, impacted the ground a second time, and ejected two passengers in the direction the balloon was traveling. The basket landed on one of the ejected passengers and then was drug along the ground a few feet further before coming to a complete stop. The National Transportation Safety Board determines the probable cause(s) of this accident as follows: The pilot's decision to fly in forecasted unfavorable wind conditions that exceeded the balloon's capabilities.

NTSB Identification: NYC07LA114

Saturday, May 05, 2007 in New Holland, PA Aircraft: Cameron Balloons A-250, registration: N5312X Injuries: 2 Serious, 2 Minor, 8 Uninjured.

On May 5, 2007, at 1900 eastern daylight time, a Cameron Balloons A-250, N5312X operated by The United States Hot Air Balloon Team, received minor damage when it contacted a tree near New Holland, Pennsylvania. The certificated commercial pilot and seven passengers were not injured, two passengers received minor injuries, and two passengers received serious injuries. Visual meteorological conditions prevailed, and no flight plan was filed for the commercial sightseeing flight conducted under 14 CFR Part 91. According to the pilot, another balloon had departed just prior to his balloon, and was headed south at approximately 3,000 feet msl. The pilot then initiated an ascent with his 11 passengers and climbed to 3,000 feet msl. He noticed that instead of his balloon going in the same direction, it started to drift to the northeast. His balloon then climbed about 500 feet higher than the other balloon, however; the direction of travel did not change, and his balloon began to descend, and eventually leveled at 1,200 feet msl. He then passed over a town and made a low pass over an open field approximately 30 minutes into his flight. His ground speed showed 12 mph. Using field glasses he then started looking for a landing area. The balloon then slowed "considerably" and he considered attempting a landing; however, his balloon was over some "farm buildings and powerlines." As the balloon approached a hilly wooded area the winds increased to 18 mph. He then noticed a grass field and made an approach for an attempted landing. The balloon struck a tree, which turned the rectangular shaped, portioned basket, long end forward. The basket then struck the ground, and a passenger fell out, striking other passengers as he fell, before finally coming to rest beneath the basket. The balloon was manufactured in 1998. The balloon's most recent annual inspection was completed on April 20, 2007, and at the time of the inspection, it had accumulated 484 total hours of operation. The pilot held a commercial pilot certificate with a rating for lighter-than-air free balloon. According to records provided by the pilot, he reported a total flight time of 1,970 hours, with 1,700 hours in balloons, and 100 hours in the Cameron Balloons A-250. A weather observation taken 7 minutes prior to the accident at Lancaster Airport (LNS), Lancaster Pennsylvania, located approximately 11 nautical miles southwest of the accident site, included winds from 260 degrees at 6 knots, visibility 10 miles, sky clear, temperature 66 degrees Fahrenheit, dew point 45 degrees Fahrenheit, and an altimeter setting of 30.02 inches of mercury.

NTSB Identification: CHI07CA189.

Monday, July 02, 2007 in Battle Creek, MI Aircraft: Cameron Balloons Z-77, registration: N4021M Injuries: 1 Minor, 1 Uninjured.

The balloon caught fire after landing during the Battle Creek Field of Flight Hot Air Balloon Festival. The pilot stated that after approximately one hour in the air, the balloon landed safely in a yard. When the pilot looked up inside the top of the balloon envelope, the "parachute top did not reseat." He attempted to reseat the top by using a "blast of heat" from the burners but it did not work. The pilot "knew the balloon would quickly sink down on top of the basket" so he turned the burners to their horizontal position and prepared to push the envelope fabric away. When the balloon envelope began to descend towards the ground the pilot reported that "we suddenly had a fire in the basket." Both the pilot and passenger were able to exit the basket. The pilot "determined the fire was coming from the burners" so he returned to the basket and turned off the fuel tanks. The fire was subsequently extinguished by the passenger and bystanders. An examination of the balloon after the accident revealed the fuel valve for the whisper burners was in the "on" position. The National Transportation Safety Board determines the probable cause(s) of this accident as follows: The whisper burner's fuel valve opening for undetermined reasons, which resulted in a fire after landing. A factor in the accident was the balloon envelope's parachute top not reseating.

31st Annual SW Iowa Hot Air Balloon Days

Creston, Iowa September 19-21, 2008

It was amazing weather for Creston - beautiful sunny skies & not windy! Pilots, crews & sponsors gathered at the Elks Lodge for registration, then moved out to the airport for the Friday evening fun flight. The target was a grade school north of downtown. 14 pilots scored on the target. The winner of the Friday evening flight was Grant Pfeifer with a 7'2" score. 2nd place was John Jensen, 3rd - Dale Dommer.

Saturday morning balloonmeister Rob Bartholomew called a 4 part task - X at the airport, a minimum distance double drop on the runway, another X on a grass runway & a judge declared goal at the cemetery. 11 pilots scored on the first X, 1st - Cory Bloom with 0.03' drop, 2nd Brian Bennett, 3rd -Brett Wiltse. 34 pilots scored on the MNDD 1st - Brett Wiltse, 2nd place tie - Alan Paul & Grant Pfeifer. 26 scored on the 2nd X - 1st - Scott Armstrong with a 0.0' drop, 2nd -Mark Harris, 3rd - Brett Wiltse. 10 pilots scored on the JDG, 1st - Jim Gunhus with a 1.06' drop, 2nd - Bill Smith, 3rd - Dale Dommer. Max's average speed on his GPS was 2.7 mph, top speed 5 mph - unheard of for Creston. Many pilots headed for town after the flight to participate in the huge parade. This wasn't the weekend for the annual IA - ISU football game, so for many, naps were on the agenda.

Saturday evening Rob called a task - score on the X on the runway, baggies would be measured on the entire length of the runway. Albuquerque 2008

After wanting to make the trip to Albuquerque for the past several years, I decided to make 2008 the year. I was presented with the opportunity to crew for Rich Jaworski for the week, so on October 1st I drove down to Omaha so we could get an early start the next day on the 16 hour drive to Albuquerque. Mike Reinert joined us for the drive down, and his wife Brenda would be flying down to joining us later in the week. The drive down was fairly uneventful, except for a thunderstorm that we ran into near Dalhart, TX. The thunderstorm was high based, and with the air being relatively dry, much of the rain was evaporating before reaching the ground. However, the storm was still able to produce strong winds, reducing visibility in blowing dust to near zero for brief periods of time. Despite this minor setback, we made it into the Albuquerque area shortly after 10 pm local time.

The next morning we made our way out to the balloon field to register and mingle with some of the early arrivals. After getting all the pilot pack goodies, we headed to the Mule Barn for lunch. For those of you that have never been to Albuquerque, this is a must stop. It is a local diner located just to the west of the balloon field with VERY generous portions of good food for the price. I think we ate there three times throughout the week. Thereafter we drove around a bit scoping out potential landing spots before heading back to the hotel to get a little rest and relaxation.

Saturday morning came quite quickly with a wakeup call around 4:30 am. Even though sunrise wasn't for nearly another three hours, we needed to leave early to beat the traffic. Unfortunately, we joined the bumper to bumper traffic on the hour and a half car ride to the field (normally the trip takes 20 minutes). I have never seen that much traffic that early in the morning! We made it in time for the briefing, which is held on the west edge of the field underneath a large black and white tower. While the briefing was going on, dawn patrol took off and we were able to watch twinkling pibals, quite an amazing sight! That morning a mass ascension was called with a predominant drift to the northwest. Given we did not have the typical drainage winds (light north to south flow at the surface); the north end of the field would take off first. With Rich's launch spot at the far north end of the field and being in the first wave, Rich was one of the first balloons of the 651 balloons in attendance in the air. The track off to the northwest meant that they were going to cross the Rio Grande, so the crew headed south to cross the bridge to get to the other side of the river. Given the winds were only 5-6 mph, the crew was able to catch up to Rich prior to landing in an empty lot in Rio Rancho. Despite the pleasant weather for flying, the weather was expected to deteriorate as a large storm system moved into the four corners region keeping everyone grounded for the next few days. This resulted in the delay of the gas balloon launch till early in the week. On Sunday morning, we awoke to the sound of rain (and partying Polish in the hotel room next door). The system moved out late in the day, but with over an inch of rain left in the system's wake, everything was a muddy mess! We went out to the swamp (otherwise known as the balloon field Sunday night) to watch a hundred or so balloons set up for night glow. Because the field was so wet, parts of the field were roped off in hopes of letting the field dry. After the glow, we met a group of balloonist back at the hotel for pizza and margaritas from Carol Weimer's world famous margarita machine.

On Monday morning, the wind was blowing a steady 10-12 mph out of north two hours before sunrise. With low expectations of flying, we headed out to the field. Traffic was much easier this morning, with many of the locals returning to their regular work routine. Surface winds once we arrived out at the field had switched out of the northwest but were still quite brisk. The decision was made to put the balloons on hold till 7:15 am. While on hold, the surface winds began to drop and we could see a few ride balloons (not associated with the fiesta) flying in the distant hills. Even though they were several miles away, you could see they were moving at a fairly good clip off to the southeast. After reconvening, the decision was made to go ahead with the task as scheduled with half the balloons taking off from the field while the other half was scheduled to fly in. Pilots and crews were reminded to review procedures for recovery off Air Force base grounds since the winds were taking the balloons towards town and the Air Force base. The ride balloons were cancelled for the morning due to the uncertainty in the winds. Before long, a Dr Pepper balloon inflated on the south end of the field and took to the air with a large American Flag hanging below the basket. The balloon hovered over the field, but once he climbed to ~150

feet agl, he began to clip off to the southeast towards town. As the other balloons began inflating, the typical drainage winds temporarily took over providing a northeast wind in the lowest 100 feet or so. This allowed pilots that got off relatively early to travel to the southwest before getting wrapped up in the prevailing northwest to southeast flow and make a roundabout track to the target that was located south of the field. It wasn't long before the stronger winds from aloft mixed down and the surface winds were blowing at a steady 10 to 15 mph. Only four balloons made an attempt to fly in to the field before the task was called due to the increasing winds. Of the four, only one made the field.

The decision was made that the large storm system that had brought all the rain to the Albuquerque metro area was far enough to the east that the gas balloon launch would be held Monday night. Because the area of high pressure behind the storm system was still building in, it appeared as though the gas balloons would head south throughout the night before heading back to the north toward the Central Plains on Tuesday. The gas balloon launch was delayed till slightly after sunset, and one by one the balloons were brought to the stage to begin their journey. As some of the balloons lifted off, they threw post cards and Swiss chocolates.

After what was a VERY short night, we found ourselves back out at the field on Tuesday morning for what appeared to be a very pleasant morning to fly. As the dawn patrol took to the skies, you could see there was a predominant light east to west flow through the atmosphere. As the sun came up, we began to spot gas balloons off on the horizon to the west. Because of the marginal conditions on the day before, the decision was made to have everyone fly into the field. We followed a line of chase vehicles out to the north to launch from the gravel pit. Other pilots elected to play the synoptic flow and found launch spots west of the field. Shortly after sunrise, we began seeing ride balloons take to the sky. Before long, it was 8 am and a steady stream of balloons began taking off from the gravel pit. We played the drainage winds that developed around sunrise, and followed the field of fabric in the air right to the target. There were so many balloons clustered around the first target that Rich threw his baggie on top of another balloon, where it sat for a second or two prior to sliding off. Past the first target there were enlarged cards sporadically placed about the field and pilots were tasked to play Texas Hold'em. Rich did quite well with this, just missing a flush by a matter of feet. Rich landed just southwest of the museum after being in the air for nearly 40 minutes. I had the opportunity to fly that morning, and I can honestly say I have never flown around that many balloons that close together before! After we packed up, we went back to the field and fueled before heading to Sandia Peak and Tinker Town. For those of you that have never been, Tinker Town is one man's self collection of Americana, which is located near the base of the road to Sandia Peak. While at both Tinker Town and at

the summit, we saw additional gas balloons pass through the Albuquerque area.

Conditions were ripe for flying again on Wednesday morning, with a prevailing flow from north to south. Rich took off at the field with a target on the old fiesta grounds, and landed in an Office Max parking lot. A few other balloons were able to navigate their aircraft into the parking lot as well. A red bull car pulled up as we were packing the balloon away and gave us all free samples of Red Bull. After the flight, Rich and Mike went to fuel the balloon while I stayed back and watched a few special shapes inflate on the field. After spending some time talking to the mounted police officers on the field, we headed back to the hotel to change quick before heading to the zoo for the big pilot and crew party. Brenda Reinert flew in late that afternoon.

Thursday and Friday morning were the special shapes rodeo, so all balloons except for the shapes and ride balloons were tasked to fly in. Rich took off at the gravel pit and landed at the old balloon field south of Fiesta Park. After the flight Rich and Mike went to fuel while we watched other pilot play the box winds. This was the first time throughout the week we had these type of conditions, and pilots like Paul Petrehn made multiple passes at the key grab prior to time expiring. We then headed to the hotel to change quick prior to riding the Tram. Once we reached the summit, some members of our group elected to ride the ski lift down on the back side. The ski lift ride takes nearly an hour, but is a great way to spend a peaceful afternoon and take in the fall colors. We then returned back to the field for the special shapes rodeo that night. Seeing over 80 special shape balloons is a sight in itself, but seeing them all glow brings out the kid in all of us. Friday morning winds were expected to become quite brisk throughout the day as a storm system was expected to move into the Albuquerque region for the second weekend in a row. The special shapes took off at the field and were in the air by 8 am. Shortly thereafter, balloons began appearing on the southern horizon. After watching many of the special shapes take off, we quickly went out and found a launch spot to make a quick pass at the field. Rich missed the field to the east, but was able to land in gravel pit to the north. Because of the storm system moving in, this was the last flight of Fiesta' 08.

Overall, Albuquerque is an amazing experience and I would highly recommend it to anyone involved in ballooning. Here are some random final thoughts regarding the event.

- Even though flights are only scheduled in the morning, you are still busy many evenings with balloon related activities.
- ♦ There are great places to eat down there! Some of my favorites included (but were not limited to): Dion's (pizza), a barbeque place just at the base of the entrance to the tram, and Pappadeaux Seafood Kitchen.

- Light is nice luxury to have in a hotel room, especially when taking a shower!
- There are lots of things to do down there in the few moments of down time: Old Town, Acoma (an Indian Pueblo), Tinker Town, Sandia Peak, the Tram, the zoo, and the Aquarium (just to name a few).

Balloon Christmas Tree



From East on I-80 go south on Highway 65 Bypass (exit 141). Continue south on Highway 65 to the Highway 5 east exit (exit 72) - about 11 miles. Go southeast into Carlisle - $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 miles. Go through Carlisle - continue on Highway 5 about 2 miles - turn north on 190th Ave (2nd left after Carlisle). Go north about 1 mile. The Balloonport is on the east side of the road (if the road curves west, you've gone too far).

From north on I-35 - at the north mixmaster, go east on I-80 (exit 87). Go east to the Highway 65 bypass (exit 141). Go south on Highway 65 to the Highway 5 east exit (exit 72) - about 11 miles. Go southeast into Carlisle - $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 miles. Go through Carlisle continue on Highway 5 about 2 miles - turn north on 190th Ave (2nd left after Carlisle). Go north about 1 mile. The Balloonport is on the east side of the road (if the road curves west, you've gone too far).

From west on I-80 - at the west mixmaster, go south on I-35 (exit 123B) about 4 miles to the Highway 5 bypass (exit 68). Go east on Highway 5 - 13-14 miles to the Carlisle exit (exit 72). From south on I-35 - take the Highway 5 bypass (exit 68). Go east on Highway 5 - 13-14 miles to the Carlisle exit (exit 72). Go southeast into Carlisle - $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 miles. Go through Carlisle - continue on Highway 5 about 2 miles - turn north on 190th Ave (2nd left after Carlisle). Go north about 1 mile. The Balloonport is on the east side of the road (if the road curves west, you've gone too far).

From Indianola to the Balloonport - go north on Highway 65-69. Turn east on Scotch Ridge Rd. Follow that to Carlisle. Go east (Rt) on Highway 5 through Carlisle - continue on Highway 5 about 2 miles. Turn north on 190th Ave (2nd left after Carlisle). Go north about 1 mi. **Or** Go east on Highway 92. Turn north on SR23. Follow that to Highway 5 (7-8 miles). Continue north across Highway 5 to 190th Ave. Balloonport is 1 mile north of Highway 5.

Note - be <u>very</u> cautious of the train tracks as you are turning onto 190th Ave. This is a very busy train track.
